## JMC Activities and Results, 1 September 2017-31 August 2018

The first year of the project was concerned with establishing EU-related courses at the University of Adelaide, contacts with other EU centres in Australia and with academics in Europe, and a website. On 27-28 November, the JMC attended the *Jean Monnet Kick-off Meeting and Biennial Conference* in Brussels.

Two new full-semester courses to be taught to senior undergraduates and to postgraduate students were created at the University of Adelaide. One course (ECON3526) on the economics of European integration is an advanced applied economics course. The other course (ECON 3527) on EU-Australian economic relations is intended to appeal to a wider range of students with law, business or international relations backgrounds. Each course involves 39 contact hours (three hours per week in a 13-week semester) plus examinations and grading of assignments and papers.

The EU-Australia economic relations course is intended to include a study tour to Europe. As a trial, a non-credit two-week study tour was organized for ten University of Adelaide final-year undergraduate students to Brussels and Paris from 25 September to 7 October, 2017; it was led by the JMC and included visits to the Australian embassies, the OECD and the EU Commission, as well as lectures and seminars at universities and thinktanks (including joint classes at SciencesPo and UPEC in Paris. In January 2018, the JMC taught the ECON 3527 subject as an intensive course over three weeks to a group of visiting EU students (under the SCRIBE21 program) and four Australian students; it included study trips to Australian businesses trading with the EU.

The economics of European integration course was taught by the JMC as a regular undergraduate course. Enrolment was somewhat disappointing, ten students completed the course, but student evaluations were enthusiastic and positive, boding well for offering in 2019.

At the University of Adelaide, the JMC also gave presentations to student groups and public lectures to wider audiences. He gave guest lectures on EU-related topics and participated in round tables and other events in South Australia.

The JMC gave short courses and guest lectures at other institutions, primarily reporting his research on EU relations with Central Asia and China.
